As communicated in the early Fall aid packages pre ED Choice expansion are being evaluated in the adjustments with most net tuition payments reducing for families; with some staying the same.

We are evaluating the timing of refunds as the ED Choice payments are flowing in full (based on approval timing).

There are just over 100 students that submitted applications that are under review. We looked up each family to determine why they are under review and have notified the families of action steps needed. Hopefully these will be resolved soon.


